BACKGROUND

- In 2017 NS passed a law that all public sector bodies will become accessible by 2030.
- To do this, all towns and municipalities are required to develop a plan that makes their built environments, services, and programs as barrier-free and accessible as possible.



<u>WHY</u>

- NS has one the highest rates of disability. 30% of people identify as having an accessibility issue, higher than the Canadian national average.
- In NS that is 285,000 people
- In our hometown that's 2000 people who experience accessibility barriers using the town's various buildings and spaces and accessing services and programs.

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BARRIERS? WHAT ARE THEY?

Barrier - something that makes it harder for some people to participate. NS Accessibility act defines a barrier as anything that hinders or challenges the full effective participation in society of persons with disabilities. This can include a communication barrier, an attitudinal barrier, a technological barrier, a policy, or a practice.

It should also be noted that the NS human rights makes it law that reasonable efforts must be taken to give a person with a disability access to a service, building, program or employment.

- Accessible Parking on Main Street is lacking.
- Snow Removal is an issue.
- The Cracks and brick work can cause problems for those with mobility issues.
- Can we make the Town's programs more sensory friendly?

The Town Needs to develop a policy that sees the adaptation of an Accessibility Lens/Impact Analysis report or statement of any development or redevelopment of its current built structure, programs, or services. To better insure an accessible Town and future.



 To develop a plan for future developments to meet accessibility requirements.
